Did vou know that when Hashem warned the Jewish people about not entering the Devir, He spoke to Moshe, and it was Moshe's job to pass on the information to the rest of the Jewish People?

Korbanot (animal offerings or grain offerings) were only allowed to be carried out in the Mishkan whilst the Jewish People were travelling in the desert, or the Beit HaMikdash (permanent Temple), once the Jewish people would reach Eretz Yisrael (the land of Israel), where they were currently heading. The land of Israel had been promised to the Jewish people by Hashem. Hashem sent a (non-dangerous) fire by night and a cloud by day, to show the Jewish people where to go. When the cloud or fire moved, they travelled and when it stopped, they built the Mishkan and their tents, and camped in that location.

Link: passing on a message.

1) Chinese Whispers

Children sit in a circle, and one person starts by whispering something to the next person. Whatever they hear, they must say that to the next person.

The last player announces the message they heard, to the group.

How wrong was it? Where did it go wrong?

2) Create a Story

Link: We are currently counting the Omer, building up each day, just like we are building up the story in this game.

Sitting in a circle, you creat a steady beat with everyone tapping their knees. Person one starts the story and each participant adds another word, on the beat. ONE DAY THERE WERE TWO LITTLE SISTERS WHO WERE SO EXCITED TO GO TO SHUL etc.

3) Wink Faint

One child steps outside the door and the Children Service leader points to another child in the circle, making sure everyone in the room has seen who was selected. The child outside enters and the game begins. The child who was selected winks at other children and they count to five and then pretend to collapse. The guesser has two guesses before everyone collapses.

Story (One of the children can read this out loud – encourage them to use expression.)
