

Key Parasha Information

<u>Summary</u>

Moshe (Moses) was speaking to the entire Jewish nation and he told that when they enter the land that Hashem (G-d) is giving you for eternity, you will work the land and bring the first fruits to the Beit HaMikdash (permanent temple), to show gratitude to Hashem.

The farmer had to keep track of a seven year cycle. During some years he had to give some crops to the poor, other years he gave a portion of crops to the Levi'im (temple workers) and other years, he was obligated to bring the crops to Jerusalem and eat them, himself. Of course, every seven years the land was allowed to rest.

Moshe also gave specific instructions on how to say the blessings and the curses on Mount Gerizim and Mount Eival. He then reminded the Jewish people that they are Hashem's chosen people, and that they, in turn, have chosen G-d. The 'chosen' people doesn't mean that they are better than other people, it means that they have a responsibility for keeping the mitzvot.


Moshe told the nation that when they cross the river Jordan, they need to cover two massive rocks with lime and write the Torah upon them.

Moshe listed all the blessings that Hashem will reward the people with, when they follow the laws of the Torah and then explained all the bad things that will come their way if they abandon the mitzvot.

Moshe told the Jewish people that they have now attained "a heart to know, eyes to see and ears to hear."

<u>Discovery</u>

Did you know that until they didn't have to bring the first fruits to the Beit HaMikdash until they actually conquered the land?



Did you know that often the Rabbi is the one who is called up to say the Barechu blessing prior to the portion of the curses being read, so that no one from the community feels upset that they have to stand next to the Torah at that time?

Who has done something special for you this week and what did they do? (If they are present, go up to them and say thank you!)

Games

1) Quiz

Ask questions about the Parasha Summary on sheet 1. Split the group into two and then ask everyone to stand back to back with someone from the other team. Ask pair 1 a question. If they know the answer, they have to jump outwards (away from the other person). Ask the one who lands first. The team with the most points wins.

2) Steal the Pomegranate

Resources: Bring a pomegranate to shul before Shabbat.

Link: A pomegranate was one of the seven species that the farmer had bring to the Beit HaMikdash

Divide your group into two and assign each player a number. Each team should have a one and a two, for example. Set a boundary line for each team and place the pomegranate in the middle. When you call out a number, that player from each team tries to capture the fruit first and get it back over to their boundary line. The first person to do this without being tagged by the other player, wins.

3) Look into My Eyes

Link: Moshe told the Jewish people that they have now attained "a heart to know, eyes to see and ears to hear."

All the children stand in a circle looking downwards and the children's service leader calls out 3, 2, 1 and everyone looks up and stares at someone else. If twp people are staring at each other, they are both eliminated from the game, until there is one winner or two people left.

Story

(One of the children can read this out loud - encourage them to use expression.)
